Be able to forgive without holding grudges, and live each day that you may share it together – as from this day forward you shall be each other's home, comfort and refuge, your marriage strengthened by your love and respect for each other. Just as two threads woven in opposite directions will form a most beautiful tapestry, so too can your two lives merged together make a beautiful marriage. To make your relationship work will take love. This is the core of your marriage and why you are here today. It will take trust, to know in your hearts that you truly want the best for each other. It will take dedication, to stay open to one another – and to learn and grow together. It will take faith, to go forward together without knowing exactly what the future brings. And it will take commitment, to hold true to the journey you both embark upon together today.

Read 1st Corinthians 13 from the Bible

Love never gives up. Love is patient. Love is kind. It does not envy, it does not boast and it is not proud. It is not rude, it is not self-seeking, it is not easily angered and it doesn't keep a record of wrongs. It always protects, always trusts, always hopes, and always perceivers. There are three pillars on which to build a relationship, Faith (in something greater than ourselves), Hope (that the brightest days are yet to come) and Love (that know no bounds). Of these three the greatest and most important is Love.

There is an art to marriage as there is to any creative activity human beings engage in. This art asks that we pay attention to the little things as well as the big ones that create the closeness of marriage. Never grow too old to hold hands. At least once each day, remember to say, "I love you." In so much as it is possible, develop the capacity to forgive and forget and heal quarrels as they happen so that you do not go to bed angry. Your courtship should not end with the honeymoon; so pay attention that you do not come to take each other for granted, and remember to speak words of appreciation and demonstrate your gratitude in thoughtful ways. It is important to have a mutual sense of values and common objectives so that you stand together as you work through the world and do things for each other, not as a duty or sacrifice, but in the spirit of joy. Do not expect perfection of each other; for only God is perfect. But do give each other room to grow and cultivate flexibility, patience, understanding, and a sense of humor in your relationship. And a marriage is not just for two people. Use it to form a circle of love that gathers in your families and the children who may become part of your lives. Find room for the things of the spirit and make your search for the good and beautiful a common search. In the words of a wise counselor, make yours a relationship in which "the independence is equal, the dependence is mutual and the obligation is reciprocal." Remember that standing together does not mean dissolving your individual selves completely into each other, but indeed means the strengthening of your own individuality. A good marriage evolves when two distinct souls face life's joy and its sorrow in harmony, not necessarily in unison. This list sounds very long and very heavy, yet it is only a small part of what is required of two people who would truly accept that making a marriage last a lifetime is an artistic endeavor worthy of our very best efforts. It is not just another relationship in our lives; it is the one that gives us courage and the support to reach out to other people in love and wholeness. It is not only marrying the right partner it is being the right partner.

You have known each other from the first glance of acquaintance to this point of commitment. At some point, you decided to marry. From that moment of yes to this moment of yes, indeed, you have been making promises and agreements in an informal way. All those conversations that were held riding in a car or over a meal or relaxing together – all those sentences that began with "When we're married" and continued with "I will" and "you will" and "we will" — those late night talks that included "someday" and "somehow" and "maybe" — and all those promises that are unspoken matters of the heart. All these common things, and more, are the real process of a wedding. The symbolic vows that you are about to make are a way of saying to one another, "You know all those things we've promised and hoped and dreamed — well, I meant it all, every word." Look at one another and remember this moment in time. Sand

Groom and Bride have chosen to use sand as a symbol for their unity. As they stand here before you they each hold an individual vessel of sand. As a whole these vessels symbolize each of their lives up to today. Each single grain of sand represents the people, places, experiences and emotions that have shaped them into unique individuals. By pouring the two vessels into one, both Groom and Bride celebrate the beginning of their two lives together into one. This not only represents the joining of their lives, but all of the amazing people that have influenced them along the way. Forever blended and even more beautiful.

Wine

For years, the drinking of wine has been customary as a way in which to celebrate special occasions. Today Bride and Groom will, in a Unity Wine Ceremony, create a rose wine, to share during their dinner this evening. Bride and Groom in this ceremony, the red wine represents the deep richness of the love in your hearts and the robust energy which keeps your loving relationship going. The white wine, fermented in oak barrels, represents the strength of a loving marriage and a lingering taste in your soul for the love you feel for each other. Combining the two,

creating a rose, is symbolic of your marriage. May your robust energy, strength, and rich love for each other be with you always.

Cup of Life

This "Cup of Life" contains a mixture of two wines. One is symbolic of happiness, joy, hope, peace, love and delight. The other symbolic of disappointment, sorrow, and life's trials and tribulations.
